Activists occupy hotel

Homelessness protesters await police reaction before stepping up squat

About 80 protesters gathered yesterday at Pigeon Park to demand that the city provide social housing, while eight others occupied the abandoned North Star Hotel, just around the corner at 5 West Hastings St.

Homelessness is on the rise in Vancouver, partly due to closures of cheap hotels that house some of the city's poorest residents. David Cunningham, of the Anti-Poverty Committee, said organizers were waiting to gauge reaction from police before bringing more people into the squat.

"We don't want to lead in a bunch of homeless people to get arrested," said Cunningham, who promised further demonstrations and occupations in the weeks to come.

At press time, police were trying to determine who owned the building before taking any action.

"The Vancouver Police Department has always stood behind any initiative to get people off the streets," said Const. Tim Fanning, adding that police want to make sure any protests are peaceful.

▶ In September 2002, 53 protesters squatted for about three months in the vacant Woodward's building before being moved to an Eastside hotel about three blocks away.

Cunningham slammed the current and past municipal governments for allowing hotels to close down, forcing some occupants onto the street.

"There are empty buildings and there are people on the street. That is a crime," yelled Theo Collins into a microphone hooked up to a small p.a.

The focus on homelessness dissolved somewhat as the microphone was passed around.

"I've been in Pigeon Park for 20 years and I'm not going anywhere," shouted one man, before lighting a crack pipe.

Another shared his thoughts on U.S. President George W. Bush.

From the fourth-storey window above, one of the squatters, Kim Kerr, yelled down that he wanted people to remember what the protest was about.

"We want the city of Vancouver to live up to its promise — a promise to buy one hotel a year," said Kerr, who is director of the Downtown Eastside Residents Association.

Court ready to rule on sewage

District in hot water for alleged dumping into Burrard Inlet



A British Columbia Provincial Court judge will decide today whether to approve charges against the province and the Greater Vancouver Regional District (GVRD) for allegedly pumping toxic sewage into Burrard Inlet.

Environmental investiga-

tor Douglas Chapman is alleging that effluent from the Lion's Gate sewage treatment is harmful to fish and therefore violates Canada's Fisheries Act.

"The GVRD, in its monitoring and reporting, is failing about one in every three of its toxicity tests," said Lara Tessaro, a staff lawyer with Sierra Legal Defence Fund, who is representing Chapman in today's charge approval hearing.

Generally, higher levels of toxic surfactants — detergents and soaps that reduce the available oxygen in

water — were found during the drier summer months when salmon runs were moving down Burrard Inlet, Tessaro said.

Christianne Wilhelmson, program co-ordinator with the Georgia Strait Alliance of the groups supporting the court action, said the ultimate goal is to get the Lions Gate plant — a primary sewage treatment plant — converted to secondary treatment.

Primary treatment separates solid wastes from liquid, while secondary treatment uses bacteria to consume bio-

special treatment

▶ The GVRD has five sewage treatment plants, of which three are secondary treatment plants and two are primary treatment plants.

"It's not acceptable, they know secondary sewage treatment is the solution to the problem, but they're ignoring that and continuing to pollute our waters," Wilhelmson said.

The GVRD is developing plans to install secondary treatment at the plant by

Bra breakthrough

Can be worn right after heart surgery

It won't make a big splash in Victoria's Secret catalogues, but a new bra could be a sure hit with women recovering from heart surgery.

Kathryn King, a University of Calgary researcher, came up with a specialized compression bra for women who experience numbness, tingling and shooting sensations in their breasts after their chests are opened for surgery.

King presented findings of the two-year study at the Canadian Cardiovascular Congress in Vancouver yesterday.

She said the bra can be worn right after heart

surgery in the operating room.

"This is why it's so neat, it can go on that early," she said. "It doesn't interfere with the monitoring equipment and they're able to have the chest tubes in."

Currently, women are asked to bring a comfortable bra to the hospital but aren't $\,$ able to wear it for up to four

The soft, tight-fitting compression bra closes in the front with a zipper and has straps that include Velcro. That makes the bra adjustable to accommodate changing breast sizes due to fluid retention or weight loss. It also has no metal clasps that can interfere with X-rays.

- 4 oz strip halibut or cod
- 2 cups Court Boullion (see recipe)
- - 1 clove garlic, finely chopped
 - 2 thsp Sambuca
 - 1 cup whipping cream
 - 2 oz fiddleheads, parboiled and drained
- 1/2 large onion, thinly sliced
- 1 stalk celery, thinly sliced
- 6 black peppercorns, crushed
- 5 parsley stalks
- 1 thsp salt
- 8 cups cold fish stock or water
- 3/4 cup white wine vinegar

- For Court Bouillon (for peaching fish):
- In a large heavy soup pot, place carrot, onion, celery, peppercorns, parsley stalks, bay leaf, salt, vinegar and fish stock. Bring to a boil, reduce heat and simmer, uncovered, for 20 minutes.

For Sambuca Fiddlehead Sauce:

- 1. In a medium skillet over medium-high heat, melt butter. Sauté shallots and gartic until shallots are softened.
- 2. Carefully stir in Sambuca; reduce by half
- 3. Stir in cream and simmer until sauce thickens slightly. Add fiddleheads and simmer, stirring until fiddleheads are heated through.

To Prepare the Fish:

- 1. Snaid three strips of fish (two salmon and one white fish) like you would hair. Skewer both ends with toothpicks to hold braid together.
- 2. In a large skillet, bring Court Soullon to a simmer. Place braids carefully in a pan and poach 12 to 14 minutes, until fish is tender.

Grits see red at debate

Rae attacks old friend Ignatieff over stance on war

Pounded by his rivals over allegedly hawkish writings on the war on terror, Michael Ignatieff got personal at a Liberal leadership debate Saturday.

Attempts by the other contenders to force the frontrunner to explain his views on torture, pre-emptive war, targeted assassinations, and open-ended detentions were drowned out by boos from his supporters.

When Bob Rae raised his writings to suggest his ideas contradicted the Charter of Rights, Ignatieff chided his longtime friend and talked about his mom.

"Listen carefully, my friend," Ignatieff replied curtly.

"You knew my mother, who was engaged to be married to a man who who was killed through (Nazi) torture at Buchenwald.

The two former university roommates then walked off the stage, walked towards their seats in the audience, and crossed paths without looking at each other.

Ignatieff supporters later drowned out Stephane Dion when he said the one-time academic will have to answer — either now or in an election campaign — when pushed to explain his writings. Dion also scolded audience members for their response to Rae's attack on Ignatieff.

Dads confront Governor General

Gov. Gen. Michaëlle Jean was confronted yesterday by a group of fathers claiming unfair treatment by the justice system in their custody battles.

A handful of demonstrators were protesting outside a conference on violence against women and stopped Jean as she left after giving a speech.

Daniel Laforest, spokesman for the group Fathers For Justice, argued that violence against men by their spouses is also an issue that needs to be addressed and wanted to give Jean a book of statistics illustrating his point.

"Two hundred and fifty thousand children have been prevented from living with their fathers," he called out to Jean. "It's serious."



Judge exiles U.S. man to Canada

Legality of sentence being debated

Jail or Canada? Malcolm Watson chose Canada.

In an unusual sentence that has immigration lawyers questioning its legality, Watson, a U.S. citizen, has agreed to stay out of the United States for the next three years as punishment for having sex with a 15-year-old female student.

Erie County, N.Y., District Attorney Frank Clark called the plea deal "a little dicey" but said the girl's family was happy with it.

Under the sentence for sexual abuse imposed by Cheektowaga Town Court, Watson can enter the United States only to report to his probation officer. Watson already lives across the border in Fort Erie, Ont., with his Canadian wife and three children.

But exiling a citizen is unheard of, said Robert Kolken, a Buffalo immigration lawyer.

"I don't see how a judge sitting in a criminal court in the U.S. can lawfully banish a citizen as a condition of sentencing," he said.

Cheektowaga Justice Thomas Kolbert could not be reached for comment.

Another immigration lawyer, Robert Berger, warned that Watson could be barred from entering Canada because of his new criminal record.

Even Watson's lawyer,

Oscar Smukler, said he was surprised by the deal.

"We did some research on the question of whether Canada might consider throwing (Watson) out, which would make him a man without a country," Smukler said.

The alternative sentence? As much as a year behind bars.

Police seeking man for questioning

Police in the southern Mexican state Chiapas said on the weekend they were searching for a Canadian man whose wife and two children were found dead in the state capital Tuxtla Gutierrez.

A man identified as Charlie Petterson, 42, of Ottawa, has been missing since the bodies of Liliana Casillas and her two children, Ixchel, four, and Ethan, seven, were found Wednesday in the family home, said Jose Domingo

Perez, a spokesman for the Chiapas state police.

Police have not determined the cause of death of Casillas and the children, Perez said.

But he said hypodermic needles with traces of an unknown substance were found near the bodies.

Perez said Petterson is wanted for questioning in the deaths but there is no arrest warrant out for him.

The Foreign Affairs Department in Ottawa was aware of the reports from Mexico and said the Canadian Embassy in Mexico City was looking into it.


Whatever was on Kenny Rogers' hand, even after he cleaned it off, the St. Louis Cardinals couldn't hit him.

hen you can flawlessly conduct an orchestra of salt and pepper shakers, you're making progress.

Vancouver Philharmonic Orchestra assistant conductor Risa McDonell grins when she describes waving her baton at the silent standins but she's serious. It's a way to learn new pieces from her Victoria mentor, Hungarian conductor Janos Sandor.

"He films me and we go over it and I cry," she says with a laugh. "The movements are hard to learn. Some standard patterns are fairly simple but you have to add a lot of finesse to these to get the sound that you want (from a live orchestra)."

Now in her second year of a two-year internship with the Vancouver Philharmonic, McDonell has already amassed valuable experience getting that sound.

"(The two conductors) just directed with so much grace

and charm and never raised their voices at the choir, even though there were definitely times when we deserved it," she says. "I thought, 'I would love to more to do something do this, love to guide people to create great music."

Is it at all like an actor saying what she really wants is to direct?

"It's the same thing for sure but I'd like to think it's not coming from an egotistical place ... my teacher (Sandor) talks about radiance from the podium — you have to get cues from the musicians and radiate energy back to them."

McDonell, who has a bachelor of music from the University of Victoria (2002) and a B.C .Teachers Certificate (2003), says she finds conducting "humbling" as there is

Pupils fit into fashion industry

Annual show highlights students' designs

Carnival costumes, fetish-wear, and bridal gowns don't have much in common.

However, these and other styles will be united Oct. 26 during Vancouver Community College's (VCC's) 19th annual Fiat Mode XIX fashion show at Granville Island's Performance Works. Grad collections range from Melissa McMahon's earthy fabrics to Cabiri Calisto's Brazilian-influenced party wear.

Calisto, who recently won Apparel B.C.'s student illustration competition, grew up watching her mother create hand-embroidered clothing. After graduating high school, she enrolled in VCC's continuing studies Fashion Arts certificate program after a visit to the school.

"As soon as I walked in the door, I thought 'this is it,' " she said. "It looked like a place where people actually worked."

Calisto's impression fit the school's mix of theory, personal expression and technical skills. Program co-ordinator Evelyn May said the graduation show demonstrates the program's breadth — from conceptual design to finished garments.

"We encourage individual pursuits and creativity," said May. "We also ...

(teach) the technical skills that allow for success in the industry."

Graduate Ben Newcombe, who currently works at Ocean Drive Leather, said he wanted to design clothes he wanted to wear, but couldn't find. Building on childhood memories, his orchestral-influenced pieces include an overcoat shaped

like the s-curve of a cello.

"The collection is reflective of growing up with dance and music," he said.

Students also enjoyed the program's flexible schedule. McMahon, whose dreamlike pieces use 'eco-fabrics' like hand-dyed bamboo and hemp and flip traditional menswear

upside down and sideways, now works at yoga clothing company Lotuswear. After studying commerce at university, she enrolled in the parttime, two-year program while working as a retail manager. Eventually, she switched to the one-year intensive program.

"I decided I wanted to do something that was not just a job, but something I enjoyed doing for a living," she said.

All the students said the one aspect uniting Vancouver's fashion scene is variety. Debra Walker, executive director of B.C. Fashion Week, agreed. She noted the city's proximity to Asia and the Western U.S. and the population's active lifestyle as inspirations feeding local apparel companies — more than 300 in the Lower Mainland, according to VCC.

"We've definitely seen significant strides in (the fashion industry during) the last few years," she said. "The sheer number of designers is a credit to the industry here."

Still, grads said Vancouver's relatively small size and the fledgling nature of the industry means it takes hard work to break in, even as it grows.

"It's a competitive industry," said McMahon. "You have to be willing to do anything to start out ... and then it's up to you to prove yourself."

Illness doesn't keep employees from work

Instead of chicken soup and lots of bed rest, most employees come to work when they're feeling under the weather, one recent survey shows

A whopping 98 per cent of employees admitted going to work when they were sick, according to a poll from Kronos Inc., a workforce management company.

Two out of five said they did so out of guilt and 39 per

Thirty-eight per cent of employees are afraid of getting sick when ill colleagues come to work, and another 35 per cent blame their employers for not encouraging sick staffers to stay home.

Two-thirds wish the company would create a work environment where calling in sick isn't penalized.

Two out of five want employers to offer onsite flu shots and another quarter would prefer an onsite health care clinic.

Job seeker takes page of inspiration from comic book

Khalid Mokhtarzada knows what it takes to get noticed by employers — four months of dedication, constant creativity, and a passion for success.

While studying business economics in university, Mokhtarzada, now 26, continued to pursue his artistic interests on the side. But after dropping out of school and working full-time for a collections agency, he knew he would be much happier working in the Internet marketing or web design industry.

But with little work experience and design knowhow, Mokhtarzada said he had a lot of learning to do before he could get his foot in the industry's door. So after spending four months studying Flash and audio, Mokhtarzada created an interactive online resumé.

"If you're in the marketing field, you need ideas and a typical resumé doesn't say much about how creative you can be," he said. But the challenge was to get prospective employers online to read his new resumé. So Mokhtarzada took a page of inspiration from a comic book

"If an employer is not hiring, they won't even look at your cover letter," he said. "I needed to get noticed, so I decided to go all out and made a comic strip."

When Mokhtarzada mailed personalized, full-colour comics to about 30 employers, he received immediate responses and positive feedback. After an interview with an Internet marketing firm, Mokhtarzada's months of creative labour paid off and he


said. "You want to show your creative side without looking juvenile."

Freedom has a price

Five For Fighting's Ondrasik talks to Metro about war and the NHL

John Ondrasik named his band after a major penalty in NHL — which tells you how much of hockey fan the heart and soul of Five For Fighting is.

And apparently he's a seasoned sports writer to boot. Having previously been published in Sporting News, Inside Hockey and Sports Illustrated's website, he now gets to contribute a once-a-month hockey column to SI.com throughout the 2006-07 NHL season.

In his Sept. 22 debut column, the California native responsible for the plaintive piano ballad Superman (It's Not Easy) opines on Marty McSorley, Bob Probert and even retired Maple Leaf Tie Domi's glory goon days and how NHL punchups have been declining in recent years.


But Ondrasik also raises another conundrum about the sport — trying to explain to his five-year-old son why fighting is bad in all other contexts except in hockey. One wonders if that was partly an inspiration behind his father-son conversation piece The Riddle, the lead-off single from Five For Fighting's third disc Two Lights.

"That's a good illustration, I never really thought about it in that way," Ondrasik says. "When your kid asks you a question about the hockey fight, you look at the fight differently than you would as, say, a passionate Marty McSorley fan. It changes how you look at the world."

The father-son motif also shows up on Two Lights' title track, but in a context related more to the war on Iraq. The song came to Ondrasik following a dinner with a young U.S. soldier bound for Iraq and a soldier's father, a Vietnam veteran.

"Every day you wake up and learn you've lost three guys," Ondrasik says. "It's this daily depression of knowing these guys are gone and it breaks your heart. Freedom has a price."

Not that Ondrasik's necessarily espousing any political or flag-waving

agenda — for this father of two, he's more interested in crafting songs about real-life loves, losses, family and personal circumstances. And since forming Five For Fighting in 1997, hard work on that craft paid off with hits 100 Years and Super-

him so – punctuality isn't what anyone expects from a man who plays in a band for a living, never mind someone who made spitting blood and breathing fire more of a trademark than any solo or song.

"That's because the people that inhabit the rock stardom world are insane," he tells me. "Self-destructive, not qualified to do anything besides ask the next person in line, 'Would you like fries with that, sir?' Rock stars and rock stardom are not the home of deep thinking. On the other hand, that doesn't concern me. ... Life is a gift, and if you

> have the balls, the tenacity to ruin God's work, you should get everything you deserve,

which is to go straight to hell. If you numb yourself with drugs, you should get the repercussions of that – become a drug addict, become a loser, and eventually lose vour life."

Like Ted Nugent, Simmons has joined the reality TV industry with A&E's Gene Simmons' Family Jew-

els. What sounds on the surface like an Osbournes retread has one crucial difference: Simmons' family - his longtime girlfriend, Newfoundland native and Playboy playmate Shannon Tweed, their two kids Nick, 17, and Sophie, 14 - isnormal and well-adjusted.

"They're both honour students." Gene brags about his kids, unmistakable pride in his voice, "coveted by the A-list schools. Both charming, they don't curse. Just great young people."

This unexpected twist makes it initially disarming, but what makes it so watchable is Gene's willingness to make himself the butt of the jokes, the blustering but selfcontented dad whose (common-law) wife and kids are one step ahead of him. It rewinds past 40 years of TV to the era of shows like Father Knows Best, albeit with leather

pants, Vegas adult film conventions, and legions of fans that range from trashy young women begging for autographed cleavage to graying suburbanites with houses full of KISS memorabilia. Gene's reality series might be the most moral primetime show on the air.

At the end of a short but quotepacked interview, Gene insists he never intended to make a reality show. "I saw it more as in infomercial, as an opportunity to shill for the different things I'm doing. If I took out TV ads, that would cost me a fortune — better just to seductively and virally tell people what I'm doing ... and in return, you get to crawl into my house and see that my life is better than yours, and that my kids are smarter and more well-behaved than yours."

up his 13-month-old son to be adopted by Madonna said yesterday he had not realized he was signing away custody "for good."

Yohane Banda signed adoption papers earlier this month, clearing the way for a Malawian judge to grant the pop singer and her husband a temporary order to take his son David.

"Our understanding was that they would educate and take care of our son just as they were doing at the orphanage," the 32-year-old illiterate peasant farmer told the Associated Press in a telephone interview from Lisaid his decision was in the best interests of his motherless son and criticized local charities who have started legal proceedings to challenge the adoption.

Banda said his understanding was that "when David grows up he will return back home to his village."

He said the director of Child Welfare Services, Penston Kilembe, and the retired pastor who heads the orphanage never told him by "adoption" it meant David would cease to be his son. "If we were told that she wants to take the baby as her own we could not have consented

I should give away my son," he said.

Banda said he was illiterate and so had no idea of the significance of the adoption papers he signed. However, Banda insisted he did not want David to return to the orphanage. "We are still thankful Madonna has rescued him from poverty and disease; we pray for the good Lord to keep blessing her for her benevolence," Banda said.

Kilembe refused to comment yesterday as did Madonna's Malawian lawyer.


